Early environmentalism was rooted in INDIG-ENGUS ERASURE AND WHITE SUPREMACY. The conservationist movement of the early 20th century was based on the romantic notion of an idyllis "wilderness".

This premise rested on not only the fictional argument of a NON-EXISTENT INDIGENOUS PRESENCE, but CLASSIST AND RACIST IMAGINATIONS of the city.

Due to this history, environmentalist are often perceived as practiced only by rich and white communities, when really, environmentalism has always been practiced by diverse groups of people, cultures, and traditions.
